Friends, it is a real pleasure to be coming your way once again with a short message from the Word of God. Listen to this 12th verse of the 8th chapter of II Corinthians. "For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not accord-

ing to that he hath not." Some people seem to have the opinion that a person's faithfulness is rated according to how much he does, especially in good works or charitable causes, or it might be in the amount of money which one is able to give to a good and worthy cause. But I want to tell you that this is not true.

God is not going to count our faithfulness in dollars and cents. If this were the case, one who was rich would have a much better opportunity to be saved than the poor man. He would be able to give large sums or contributions whereas the poor man would only be able to give a little.

The scripture which I have just read clearly indicates that every man and woman is going to be held responsible for that which they have in their possession. In other words, they must be faithful to all which God has entrusted in their care. This might be financial affairs or talents and abilities which God has given. If you have more material possessions, there is a greater responsibility upon you than the one who has very little.

Friends, God is looking at our hearts to see how faithful we are with what we have to do with. He does not expect the impossible. In fact, one scripture mentions that we should give our

reasonable service. Listen to this reading from the 21st chapter of Luke beginning with verse 1. "And he looked up, and saw the rich men casting their gifts into the treasury. And he saw also a certain poor widow casting in thither two mites. And he said, Of a truth I say unto you, that this poor widow hath cast in more than they all: For all these have of their abundance cast in unto the offerings of God: but she of her penury hath cast in all the living that she had."

No doubt, those two mites which the widow woman put into the service of the Lord meant more to her than many riches of those who were able to give freely. In fact, it says that she cast in all the living that she had. In other words she gave 100% of all her living.

New Testament teaching is not one tenth of what you earn, that is to be the Lord's, but we understand that everything we have belongs to God. We are only stewards. It does not belong to us. So here is the question I want to ask, "Are we faithful servants of the Lord?" If you have a little, God wants you to be faithful to remember him. If you have much, he still wants you to be faithful.

In the 25th chapter of Matthew we are told of a man who was going to be traveling to a far country, but before he left he called in his servants. To one of them he gave five talents, to another two and to another one. He, no doubt, felt that some servants were capable of taking care of more than others. Consequently that is the way he divided them. Now he did not give these talents to his servants to go and spend upon their own personal use, but they were to look out for their master's welfare.

Now we read further in this 25th chapter of Matthew that one day their master came home. He called in his servants and wanted to know how well they had prospered. Well, the first man who had the five talents reported that he had gained five more. That was good. His Lord was well pleased. The one who had two talents reported that he also had gained two more. That was good, and the Lord was well pleased with him. But listen to what this man said who only had one talent. "Then he which had received the one talent came and said, Lord, I knew thee that thou art an hard man, reaping where thou hast not sown, and gathering where thou hast not strawed: And I was afraid, and went and hid thy talent in the earth: lo, there thou hast that is thine."

Now one might be inclined to think he was justified in making such an excuse because he had so little to do with, but was he really justified? Did he have so little that his Lord did not even care what he did with it? No, friends, that is not the case at all. His Lord called him a wicked and slothful servant because he had failed to make good use of what had been left in his care.

Did you ever read about Alexander the Great? In a way he was a ruthless and a wicked man. He conquered kingdoms all the way from the north of Africa, the west of Asia, and the east of Europe. Now, of course, he did this by military force and might. If one stood in his way he did not hesitate to kill him if it would further his cause. He took many dangerous chances. It is reported that at one time he took with him 35,000 troops and crossed the Hellespont, a strip of waterway from one to four miles wide, which often had strong and dangerous currents

flowing in it. Rulers and kingdoms feared when they knew that Alexander the Great was coming. In fact, sometimes they made overtures of peace for fear of him.

It is said of Alexander the Great that when he had conquered all the known world of his day he sat down and wept because there were no more kingdoms to conquer. But here is what I want to get across to you. One day when he was asked who should be his successor to the throne when he was gone, his reply was this, "To the worthiest".

Even so, friends, I believe that God is looking for those who are the most faithful to entrust with his riches and the spreading of his cause throughout the world. If you are faithful in the little things, God will be pleased to entrust greater things in your care.
