"Here am I; Send Me"

Radio Broadcast for week of October 20, 1968 (See back page for list of stations.)

. . . and a cheerful greeting, friends, wherever you may be hearing the sound of my voice. We are certainly happy to be coming your way once again with a short gospel message and we are glad for each one that is tuned to THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Okla. We hope you'll make it a regular listening habit to hear this message each week over this same station. I hope you will listen carefully for the next few minutes and as a result of it, it is my sincere desire that your life may be enriched and molded after the pattern and plan which God has for you. But first listen to this song: "Never Ending Joy".

Here is a question which the voice of the Lord asked some 735 years before Christ. "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Isa. 6:8 Did you know that the Lord is still asking that question today, "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" You see the possibilities are unlimited and the openings for consecrated, dedicated, and qualified servants of God knows no bounds. I suppose one reason it is this way is because there are so few who are listening to that voice of God. Now you might pick up your newspaper and scan through the want ads in the classified section. There you will find job after job open to those who are willing to accept positions scattered throughout that nation. Perhaps these jobs may range anywhere from that of a ditch digger, or a dishwasher, to a highly skilled and educated technician or an electronic engineer. The salary is sometimes fantastic, especially if the qualified applicants are hard to find. But wait a moment. I want to show you something. This call to Isaiah which went out many years before

Christ found him in a very poor condition to go anywhere to proclaim the gospel. Listen as I begin in the 5th verse of this same chapter. "Then said I, Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts. Then flew one of the seraphims unto me, having a coal in his hand, which he had taken with the tongs from off the altar: And he laid it upon my mouth, and said, Lo, this hath touched thy lips; and thine iniquity is taken away, and thy sin purged."

Now, if we were to take this chapter and begin reading from the first and study carefully its contents perhaps we would observe several things. But just to mention a few notice this:

First: Isaiah caught a vision of God. He saw him high and lifted up and he realized that it was a holy God and one which ruled the universe. There was no question in his mind who controlled

the things of the world, for God had been revealed to him in His majesty. Friends, isn't this what we need today. We need to be fully convinced that God is still the ruler of the universe. And I believe that he does rule the universe. Listen to this scripture from Psalms 103 and verse 19, "The Lord hath prepared his throne in the heavens; and his kingdom ruleth over all." Now some people think that they get into the power because of their own political cleverness or because of their ability to do things, and this may be true to some extent. But let me show you something else. God has a hand in the affairs of men and this is something we should never forget as long as we live in this world. Listen to this verse from Psalms 66:7, "He ruleth by his power for ever; his eyes behold the nations: let not the rebellious exalt themselves. Selah." Now wouldn't you say that God has more power than men. I say yes, a thousand times over again. And Isaiah saw him in the exalted position which he holds over the kingdoms of men. And friends, we should not forget this fact. God's eyes are ever watching and seeing the things which takes place. He knows every crooked move and every dishonest act which is committed. Another thing which Isaiah observed was this:

Second: "Then said I, Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips:" You see, he lived among a people that were wicked and rebellious. Do you think that kind of people lived only in the day of Isaiah? Oh, no, my friends, let us face the facts. I am persuaded that some of those people are still living today, or that is that type of people -- those who are rebellious against God. Now when

you catch a glimpse of the power of God then you will be made to see how wholly insufficient you are within yourself. Isaiah was not ready to go anywhere to tell people of the power of God because he felt that he was contaminated with the sins of his day.

But on the other hand, God is ever looking for material which he can use. He sometimes takes one who is in the rough and makes a diamond of them. He saw something in Isaiah which was as a diamond in the rough. With a little polishing and a little cleansing, yes, perhaps I should say more than a little cleansing, a great deal of cleansing in fact, he could be made a man that would fearlessly declare the Word of God and that bring it without fear or favor. And that brings us to the next thing what we observe from the 6th chapter of Isaiah.

Third: 'Then flew one of the seraphims unto me, having a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with the tongs from off the altar: And he laid it upon my mouth, and said, Lo, this hath touched thy lips; and thine iniquity is taken away, and thy sin purged.' Friends, this coal would represent the cleansing power of salvation. Before we are ready to speak for Christ there must first come a cleansing. Our hearts, our lives, our minds, and our thoughts must be first purified within and without. We must catch a vision of the call of God. We must offer ourselves willingly to his service and we must yield ourselves without reserve to his cleansing power. Then, and then only do we come to this last and glorious statement made by Isaiah. Listen:

Four: "Then said I, Here am I; send me." And now let us sum it up in this way. There is a job to be done for God

in this world and God is looking for qualified witnesses for him. When you get a vision of his glory and greatness you'll gladly and willingly submit yourself to the cleansing power of his blood. From that moment on the supreme desire of your life should then be like Isaiah of old, "Here am I, send me."

Friends, I ask you plainly, have you caught a vision of God's power? Have you realized yourself as lost and undone without him? Have you sought him earnestly and fervently for the cleansing power which will remove every thing which is sinful and evil from your life? If so you are now ready to give an answer to God's demand for service, "Here am I, send me." There will then be a willingness to go anywhere, say anything, or do anything within your power to please God. Is that what you are doing today? If not, from this moment on it is my desire that your life may be changed and you can honestly say, "Here am I, Lord, send me".

Shall we pray,

Our Father,

Take the words of the message and may thy spirit accompany them to the heart of those who are honest and willing to be of service for thee. Burn out all dross which would hinder us from being all that you would have us to be and use us for thine own glory and to thee we will give the praise through Christ our Lord. Amen

May I take just a moment to tell you that THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast is heard on this station weekly. Our mailing address is Guthrie, Oklahoma and my name is Willie Murphey. Will you pray with us that God may awaken each and every one who comes in con-

tact with his word and may the word serve as a live coal from off the altar to awaken each one to the call of God's service. We are trusting God by faith to keep his word going forth on the air and through the mail each week. Your co-operation is appreciated. 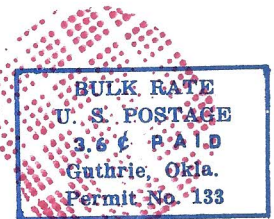
