Responsibility

Radio Broadcast for week of September 20, 1970 (See back page for list of stations.)

"It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness. The Lord is my portion, saith my soul; therefore will I hope in him. The Lord is good unto them that wait for him, to the soul that seeketh him. It is good that a man should both hope and quietly wait for the salvation of the Lord. It is good for a man that he bear the yoke in his youth." Lam. 3:22-27 Now take another look at this 27th verse. It says, "It is good for a man that he bear the yoke in his youth." I believe this to mean that there are certain responsibilities which come our way. We should be willing to share our duties and to do them faithfully for the Lord. How easy it is to shirk responsibility. Do you remember that expression which says, "Let George do it"?

I believe that this is one of the troubles of our world today. There are too many folks who are unwilling to accept their responsibility. Just for instance let me tell you this. At a nice little rest stop along the highway we stopped to rest and later we fried some bacon and eggs. There were those tall pine trees and it was a lovely spot. You see, we had a little charcoal grill along with us and it came in very handy to fix our meal at this rest stop. Now, if everyone that stopped at a rest stop would pick up their scrap paper, tin cans, and bottles and put them in the garbage barrel, how easy it would be for those who maintain those rest areas to keep them clean. But would you believe it that I saw near this particular rest stop garbage and trash such as bottles and cans that had been tossed over the fence nearby rather than being placed in the garbage barrel. What is the matter? Were these folks who littered this rest area unwilling to share

the responsibility which rightfully belongs to them? How much more pleasant life would be for other people if each one was willing to do their part and share their responsibility. This means that those who do not share their responsibility are a part of the problem and not the solution.

Now just as this is true in the natural, how much more so is it true spiritually. If you are not helping to solve the complications of life you are part of the problem. Nevertheless there are those who want to enjoy the good things of life, the blessings, and the favors of God and still share little or no responsibility.

I appreciate the encouraging letter which we recently received from Sis. Mamie Norcutt of Ft. Scott, Kansas. Sis. Mamie usually listens to the broadcast. I want to quote a part of your letter. Quote, "I thank God for the

message God gave you on praying without ceasing. Sometimes I have trials with the devil. Usually trials come through other people, but when the devil can't find people to make them a trial to you, he'll come and try to crush you down and defeat you. I'm so glad I can flee to God and come out with victory in my soul. Yes, it takes much prayer. But it is a great privilege and opportunity yet it is our duty to pray. It's an opportunity that's precious to my soul. I love that sweet hour of prayer. I always, in my younger days, intended to go through life on a bed of ease, because if you carried too much responsibility, I thought it would age you and put gray hairs in your head, and I never planned on growing old. But God has changed me, I'd rather carry a heavy burden for God and his glory than to live on a bed of ease." End of quote. Thank you, Sis. Mamie. I am glad the Lord caused you to be willing to bear some burdens for him.

Now listen to this scripture, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matt. 11:28-30. Here is a poem:

This is the way we are endeavoring to do on this broadcast and also on those printed weekly copies which we mail. We are looking to the Lord for our reward when we get to the end of life's journey.
