Christian Trials - - Part 1

Radio Broadcast for week of February 28, 1971 (See back page for list of stations.)

Good morning, friends. It is indeed a privilege that I have to come your way another time by means of radio. I am going to talk to you about "Christian trials". This doesn't mean that everything that tries you is "Christian" but I do believe that every true saint of God is going to be tried, sometimes in various and sundry ways. Your trials might even seem to be peculiar ones and hard to understand. But then again that is part of the thing which makes it a trial. So to begin with let me give you this verse,

"Many shall be purified, and made white, and tried; but the wicked shall do wickedly: and none of the wicked shall understand; but the wise shall understand." Dan. 12:10 So you see, the Lord is going to prepare a people to inhabit the realms of heaven who have been tried and purified. It is not the unclean which are going to enter the pearly gates. They will be left on the outside. But those who are going to enter the joys of the Lord are the ones who will have been tried and proven. Are you willing for the Lord to put you in the furnace of trial? Well, I don't think any of us really enjoy it in a sense, but it surely does produce good effects for those who are true when tried.

Listen to this verse from Zech. 13:9, "And I will bring the third part through the fire, and will refine them as silver is refined, and will try them as gold is tried: they shall call on my name, and I will hear them: I will say, It is my people: and they shall say, The Lord is my God." Observe from this text that it is the fire which refines the

pure gold. Then the dross can be skimmed off and thrown away, the undesirable is discarded, and it is the good which is brought out in trials and persecutions.

Listen to this scripture, "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy." Those verses are found in I Peter 4:12, 13. Did you notice that it said to rejoice? That seems unusual, doesn't it? To ask a person to rejoice while he is in a trial. But that is what it says to do. The Lord knows it is going to work for our good and his glory if we are faithful. First Peter 1:7 puts it this way, "That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ". So you see, the trying of our faith is really a blessing, even though

it might be a blessing in disguise. We should always remember Rom. 8:28, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." So just bear in mind that these trials can not come to us unless God first permits them.

Now, remember this: If the Lord loves you, you must endure chastening. This is the correction which the Lord gives when he sees that we need it. Those who do not endure chastening are not the sons of God, for the father loves each of His children and he does chasten them when they need it. God forbid that we should be lukewarm and indifferent. Listen to these verses, "So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot: I will spue thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked: I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see. As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent." Rev. 3:16-19

If you think you ought to be exempt from trials, listen to this verse, "Yea, and all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution." II Tim. 3:12 Do you want to live a godly life? Do you really want to be separate from the world? Then you are bound to have persecutions.

But if you are really truly and diligently serving the Lord, then these verses ought to be a comfort to you: "These

things I command you, that ye love one another. If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you. If ye were of the world, the world would love his own: but because ye are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hateth you." John 15:17-19 And now this poem:

He sat by a furnace of sevenfold heat,

They are still working on the water lines to restore water to homes in the worst area. There was quite a lot of damage around us, but we were protected. Thank the Lord. . . .
