A Message to Parents

Radio Broadcast for week of May 7, 1972

"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6. Good morning, friends. I am happy to be bringing you another short gospel message which I hope will prove a blessing. Did you notice the words of that verse? What do you think of that? How many years "outdated" do you consider that scripture? Do you really believe it will work? If you do, then perhaps you will bear with me a few moments as I give you some thoughts to accompany this verse.

"Train up a child in the way he should go: "-I really don't believe this is speaking primarily of the state or the school doing this training. Perhaps they might be a contributing factor but real moral and spiritual training should begin in the home and the parents are the first ones who should start it. Child training should begin the day it is born. A long time before is better. One aged saint put it this way, "Child training should begin twenty years before it is born!" You see, that would be starting with the parents, which is really not a bad suggestion.

But in an age of much civil and moral disobedience, perhaps it would be well if we could discover some of the reasons these things exist and take steps to prevent them in the future and yet unborn generations. I say, the reason so many "Delinquent children" get into trouble is because there have been some "delinquent parents." We may as well place the responsibility where it belongs. If the children had been given more specific and intensive training

while their minds were tender and willing to learn the right things, there would be less disrespect and disobedience existing today. Oh, for more "miracles of the age, "set as beacon lights, in the form of truly Christian homes in this day! But as the Christian homes crumble, so does the nation. There is an old saying: "The hand that rocks the cradle, rules the world." I believe that, but the sad part of it is, so many of those hands have ceased to rock the cradle, and as a result crime and violence is widespread, robbery is the order of the day, in the absence of divine authority and disregard for the laws of the land.

The foundation for Godly living begins in the home. Parents should realize they are the examples and patterns as they set the standard for those young minds and hearts. Parenthood should be a three-way Partnership--father, mother, and God. Unity and harmony between them is very important. It has been declared that "Three months of wise parental training will do more to

determine the natural possibilities and tendencies of a child than three years of school after fourteen."

What we are is a great contributing factor as to what our children shall be. Brave parents with the tender love of a heavenly Father over them go hand in hand into the valley of the shadow and to them is given a child, a precious gift. Think of the responsibility which comes with this gift. Those who refuse to take the responsibility of parenthood miss much in life. Responsibility, did I say? Yes. Appalling ones! They bend the back and whiten the hair! But it is God's way. It is a sublime privilege to so work for and with Him. He is a good paymaster. He works exceedingly and marvelously in and through His obedient children. He provides all powerand grace. He comforts and encourages and teaches. His smile is glory. His blessing, riches. Oh, think of the joy of going to Him at the end of life's brief day and saying to Him, "Behold I and the children which thou didst give me."

The school life of former years may have hadits thrills, its adventures, its battles and victories, --but this homeschool, this desperate determination to know and do and be just right, because there are immortal souls given into our keeping, whose destiny depends upon our training and influence because we brought them here--is a real challenge.

Oh, all the experiences of former years are not to be compared with this Christian home training which young parents are about to get. Much is at stake.

They should be like Judah when he was pleading for his younger brother, Benjamin: "For how shall I go up to my father, and the lad be not with me?"

I remember hearing a little saying on a certain broadcast station. They say it sometimes along about 12 O'clock at night. They say: "Do you know where your children are?"

Did you know the Bible is full of instructions and wisdom for parents? Like Hannah, we should make for our Samuel a little coat from year to year. Provisions should be made for a growing, developing, changing body, mind and soul. The atmosphere we create in the homehelps to make the child. If there is confusion, quarreling and dissention, then look out for the influence on those young minds. If the parents cannot agree, then how should we expect those children looking on to be different? But if there is restful understanding, thoughtfulness and kindness-these basic principles are of great value. cheer, encourage and inspire the child on to greater things.

Now a word about a mistaken idearriches are not necessary for happiness. It is true finances are important, but if there are two devoted parents, with a vision, they will find a way for happy mealtimes and quiet evening talks where God is reverenced. The delicate plants of childhood will not thrive and develop and blossom as they should, in an atmosphere of harsh blame or criticism. Some one has said, "Nagging and fault-finding in the home are twin brothers to the jail and penitentiary."

Parents, watch for inconsistencies in your lives, for those boys and girls of yours are taking notice of your example. Children we might say, are a second edition of their parents. What we are, determines largely what they will be. Remember, you have this stewardship from God. You are responsible to Him. The name father is a name that should

be as sacred as mother. Think of a tragic situation where a father is too busy to spend time with his son--realizing too late that others have companioned with his son and left him a wreck in soul and body. Yes, we can say that we did our best--but did we really? We might have known how to do better.

Takeforinstance, farmers whose crops fail, and whose stock turns out scrubby and scrawny, do they just sit down and meekly starve? Do they weep and say that God is unjust, or their neighbors have failed them? What do they do in a case like that? Let me tell you--they pay out good money for books that will help them; they consult specialists and employ experts. They discern what is wrong and attend to the matter promptly. They gather strength and courage and set to work much harder and with increased knowledge. Faith in what they have learned by failure tells them it's not too late to redeem the crop or save the stock.

And does not the word of God and the laws of nature teach us the same thing-that we should be in earnest to see that we have well-trained, well-behaved, God-fearing sons and daughters who will go out from their home to be a blessing and an example of what God can do?

Perhaps after hearing this much, some will say, "Please be more specific. There are so many problems. Tell us what to do." Friends, it is true that I have mostly given you general principles. I know there are many problems, but I also know and can assure you God has the grace and wisdom to instruct you what to do in every decision. You will need that grace and understanding which comes from him only. The wisdom of God promises to give lib-

erally. His special help in answer to your prayer in every time of need, all of these will help you to become the master of the situation when it arises.

Let us pray.

Our father, we know we are living in an age when there is much disobedience, and ungodliness. Yet we are aware that God has the grace for every situation. Helpand direct each of your people who are trusting in you for the wisdom and understanding to train their child in a right way, and thine shall be the praise and glory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.
